After all These Years: Still Advocating

What has been done to confront issues specific to the diversity within labor? Participants will gain an understanding of CLUW's rich history of ensuring that issues of concern to women are a priority of the labor movement and how they can become involved.

Let the Leader in You Shine

Participants will learn the stages of leadership development and create an individual action plan for their leadership journey

The Next Generation: Mentoring Future Union Leaders

This workshop is intended for union leaders and for those who want to develop union members and staff in order to keep and increase the union's strength. In this workshop we will examine the positive aspects of mentoring and provide a resource for expanding mentoring taking into account the diversity in the labor movement.

Women and Global Solidarity

We live in a global economy, but how does it work? This workshop will look at the basics of how a global economy works and how women workers participate in world economies. It will also focus on solidarity efforts that truly influence collective bargaining and human rights. Join this discussion and add your thoughts about how we can build a global movement for change.

Organizing 101

We know we need to organize or our unions will die on the vine, but how much time are we devoting to it? This workshop will offer skill building exercises to boost our confidence in both internal and external organizing conversations. We will draw from inspiring campaigns of women workers who organized and won. We will also share tips on getting the ball rolling when it seems like organizing new workers is an impossible feat.

Dangerous and Unladylike: The Working Women Who Made History

From the earliest mill hands and runaway slaves, American working women and girls have refused to be defined as passive or submissive. We organized, struck, and redefined the struggle for economic rights for all. In this workshop we'll go behind the SHEroes and ask how women organized and what our vision of justice has been.
