## CLUW... Designing Our Own Future

#### CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS

Delegates adopted the following amendments to CLUW=s national constitution:

**#1, 2, and 3** B extending terms of CLUW officers, state vice presidents, and union delegates/alternates to the National Executive Board from two to four years;

#4 B permitting chapters to choose twoor four-year terms for their delegates/alternates to CLUW=s NEB; #5, 6, and 7 B establishing a system of accountability for CLUW state vice presidents.

### McENTEE SALUTES NEW YORK=S EVERYDAY HEROES

AEven though our country looks so different, our mission remains the same,@ AFSCME Pres. Gerald W. McEntee told the Convention. He said

AAs we mourn, we must move forward. He described labor=s losses B 700-800 union members. He also praised labor=s heroes. AThe only people going <u>up</u> the stairs that day were trade unionists.

McEntee outlined some important issues for America=s future: minimum wage increase, a living wage, prescription drug coverage, patients= bill of rights, pay equity, contraceptive equity, reproductive choice, and affirmative action.

At a time when so many organizations have cancelled meetings, he saluted CLUW for setting an example for American labor and the nation. Alt is time for union women to take their rightful and earned places in the American labor movement,@ he said.
